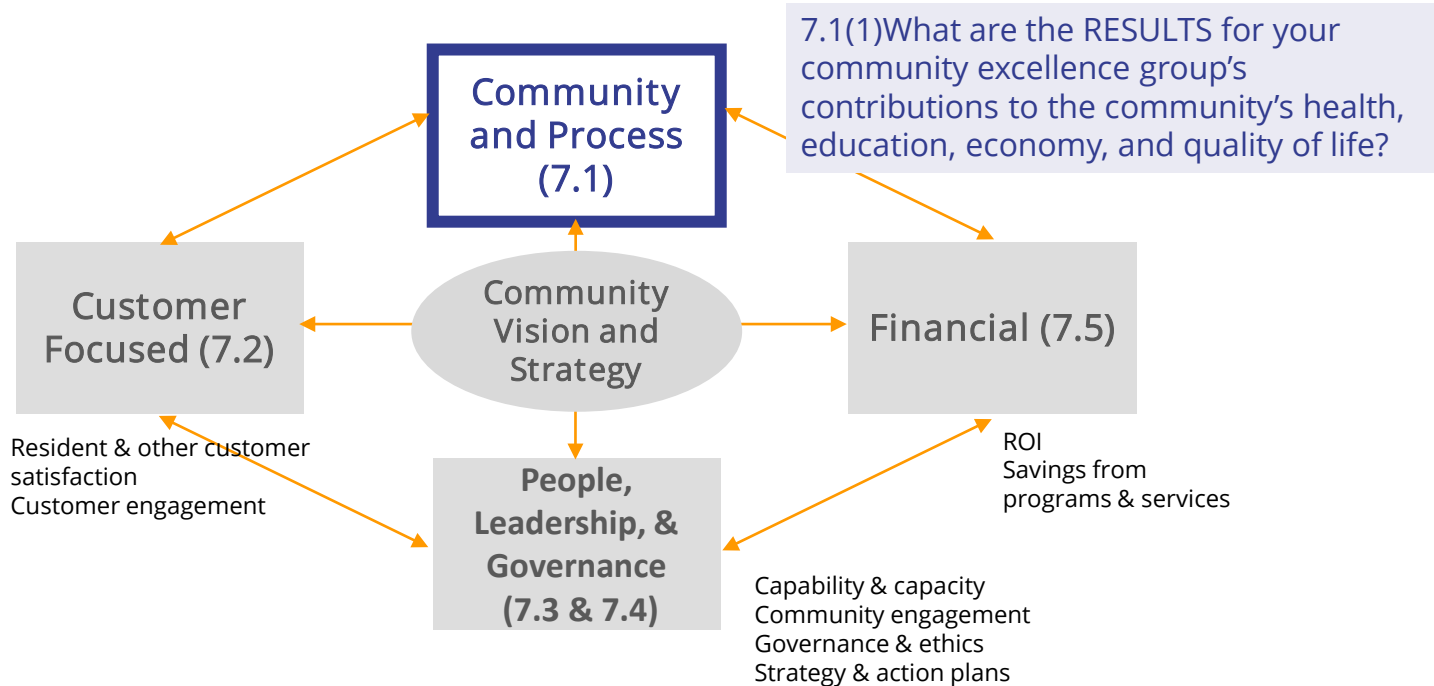

A Closer Look



7.1(1)

- Outcome measures that show overall impact
- Snapshot of overall health and well-being of a community
- Often referred to as lagging indicators
- Big picture
- Of interest to the many stakeholders






Most Everything Else

- Mostly process measures
- Helps understand how well a process, program, or action plan is performing
- Often referred to as leading indicators
- Impacts the big picture

Minimum Criteria for Selection

- ❑ Available at the neighborhood level (Census tract)
- ❑ Connects to other indicators
- ❑ Measure meaningful dimensions of community life, universal to all communities
- ❑ Must be derived from a credible data source
- ❑ Updates must be at consistent intervals
- ❑ Must be comparable at the local, state, and national level

 Quality of Life: Social and Community	Adults with 14+ “Not Good” Mental Health Days Per Month
 Quality of Life: Housing	Homes with Suboptimal Conditions

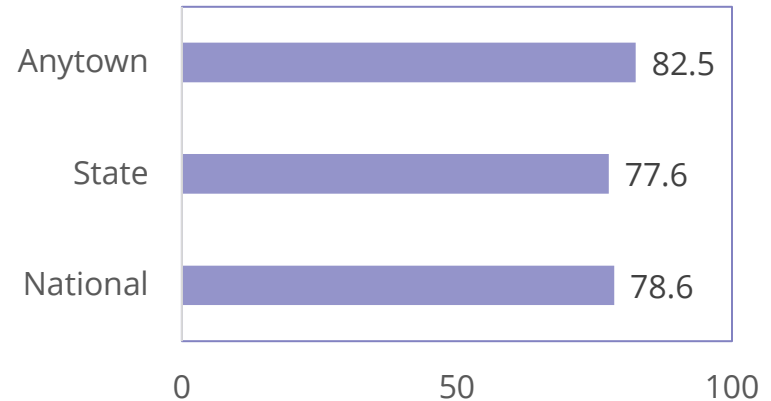

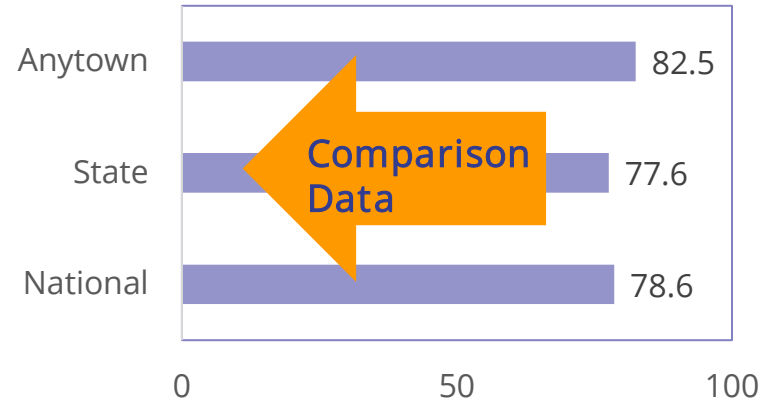

Economic Vitality

Median Household Income: Do people have resources to meet their basic needs?

Why It Matters: The median household income is the point at which half of the households in an area earn more and half earn less. Higher incomes lead to greater economic stability and reduce pressures associated with meeting basic household needs such as buying healthy foods or paying bills. Lower incomes can also limit a person's access to physical and mental healthcare.

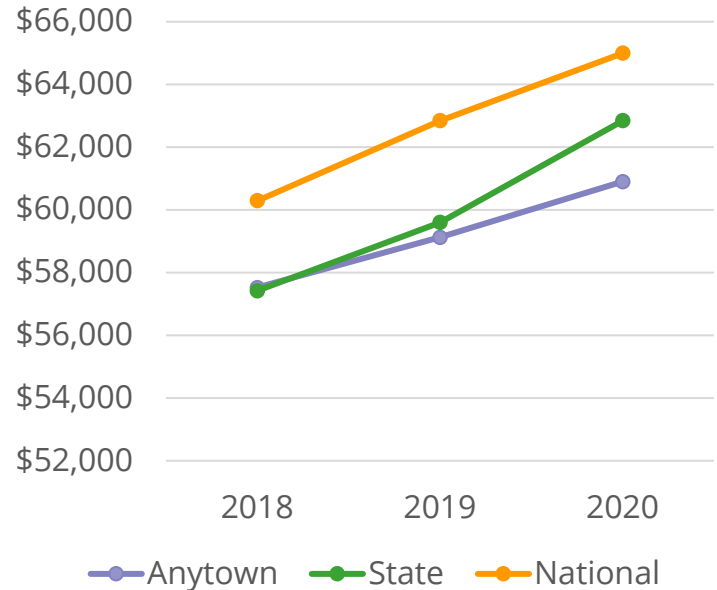
Median household income is reported by the US Census Bureau.

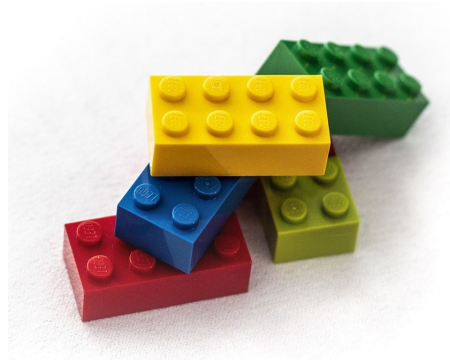

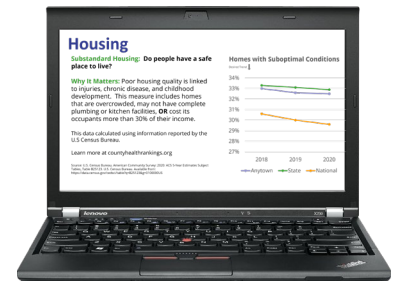

The Limitations

- Federal agencies may not record and report data the same as state agencies
- Data is not “real time” data
- Some data sets are only released every few years
